Financial Report

Cross Country Ski Nova Scotia 2023-2024 Treasurer report May 16 2024

Revenue:

The winter of 2023-24 saw the board of Cross Country Ski Nova Scotia, successfully deliver a number of exciting new initiatives. From a financial perspective, annual performance, net revenue variance was +1.3%.

In absolute revenue terms, the largest variance occurred in the funding a grant revenue +7%, driven by PSO and NSO grants that were not budgeted.

Program revenue - +78% due to un-budgeted revenue from coach education and higher than expected member due 47% and rental revenue 42%.

Expenses:

Program and General expenses 15% over budget, driven primarily by Skill Development Program materials, Provincial Championships expenses (awards), Nordique Canada AGM expenses.

Administrative expenses were 20% over budget, largely due to additional staff/contract employee costs of 35%. I believe this is the result of the GL code including the ski ambassadors at contract employees though those expenses would have been budgeted in the the program expenses.

Provincial Team:

The provincial team did not provide a budget. Revenue of \$34826.43 and expenses of \$36375.63 Running a slight deficit of -\$2111.20. Note that the Provincial team bank account balance stands at \$6145.54.

This year also saw the departure of Hilda Lapierre from Sport NS, Hilda was provided our bookkeeping and prepared all our monthly financial reporting. As we head into the summer months when financial activity is traditionally less, we have the opportunity to define expectations so that up to date and useful reporting is available when critical decisions are made in the fall/winter.

Overall, we had a successful year and are well positioned to sustain this level of activity throughout our current funding cycle. Some opportunities for improvement would be to better define project budgets to align with GL codes. This would enable clearer reporting. I also recommend that the Provincial ski team submit annual budget.

Administrative Coordinator's Report

It's been a busy winter for CCNS. In this role, I am responsible for CCNS along with Boxing NS and the Karate Nova Scotia other Sport NS files. During my 11 months in this position, I have completed administrative duties, managed financials, assisted with reports and applications and assisted in the co-managing of the CCNS school ski rental program with Kat Kitching as well as the newly created ski ambassador position with Melanie MacDermid

CCNS Administration – Communication with Nordiq Canada and many administrative tasks and ongoing Sport NS system components to ensure the operation of CCNS.

Administrative tasks of note for 2023-2024:

- CCNS Financials as a result of much effort put in by myself, Tara, Kris and Hilda LaPierre, CCNS is on track to receive regular financial statements through the Sport NS Administrative Centre. By working with Hilda, CCNS has ensured that there will be effective communication in regards to financial accountability and will see real-time financial information in terms of budget and year-to-date.
- Annual Outcomes Annual outcomes are a joint initiative with Sport NS, the Department of Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage, and the Canadian Sport Center Atlantic.

The purpose is to track some of CCNS's overall goals for the year to see where funding is being put to use. In March of this year, the board and I got together to create these and they were submitted and approved by the organizations listed above. Throughout this year we will have check-ins on these goals to see where we are at as they look to structure what hopes to be another great year ahead!

I would like to thank the CCNS Board of Directors for another great year. I have enjoyed working with the board and appreciate their trust, guidance and enthusiasm as I have to learn my way around this role.

CCNS Annual Update

CCNS Annual Update- 2023/2024

The 2023/2024 Ski season was an exciting and busy one for CCNS as we pursued several new projects.

Masters Camp/ Adult Instructor Program

Working together with Stephen Novosad from Nordiq Canada, our Coach Development Lead, Dave Hubley, had the vision to combine a camp for providing ski instruction to Masters aged skiers, alongside the delivery of the new Adult Instructors Coach Development Program.

Nordiq Canada has developed a program similar to their Community Coaching stream for Youth Programming to make Adult Instructor education more accessible across the country. CCNS was instrumental in the trialing of the program at last year's Coaching Camp that was held at NHN. We were also offered one of the first 3 deliveries of the program, held at Charlo, NB in early January 2024. CCNS was generously granted funding from the Department of Communities, Culture and Heritage, Support for Sport Nova Scotia and Nordiq Canada to be able to send 4 coaches to the Charlo camp to obtain Instructor and/or Learning Facilitator status and an additional coach to the program held in Val Morin, Que. This leaves CCNS in an excellent position to be able to deliver the program within the province to Adult Instructors in the upcoming years.



This instructional program was tied into an extremely successful sold-out Masters Camp where skiers from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick joined together for ski improvement skills and drills in both the classic and skate techniques. Reports back from participants were that this was an excellent experience, with enthusiastic instruction that they hope will be an annual event.

CCNS was also able to deliver another Community Coaching Course to 3 coaches and Instructor John who braved a blizzard to do so.





School Ski/Ski Ambassador Programs

One of the primary objectives of CCNS is to introduce Nova Scotians to Cross Country Skiing across the province. This year, in addition to our School Ski Program, we were able to bring on board 3 Ski Ambassadors to spread the word about our sport.

Kat Kitching returned as the coordinator for the School Ski program and took on an organizational role in coordinating with our 2 mainland Ski Ambassadors, Claire Miner and Stacy Payne. We were also delighted to have Michelle Richards represent CCNS in the Cape Breton Region. The vision of the School Ski/Ski Ambassadors was to connect with all ages of skiers from school-aged children through Masters, all levels of skiers from new-to-snow to intermediate skiers and to reduce the barriers that some groups have in accessing the sport.

With the fleet of skis that CCNS has and maintains for the School Ski program the Ski Ambassadors we were able to take those skis to schools, parks, recreation centers and to groomed ski club locations to offer programming that included social skis, family skis, basic instruction and skill improvement clinics.

As will all things cross country skiing in Nova Scotia, flexibility was required in working with the weather and unfortunately not all of the events that were planned were able to take place. However, those contacts were made and hopefully those groups will find themselves on skis next year.

On the mainland we were able to reach approximately ~750 participants, with another ~500 who had expressed interest in programs that were canceled due to the lack of snow.

Much of the work of the Ski Ambassadors was generously funded through Nordiq Canada's Equity Initiative Grant as we were working hard to reach groups that have historically faced barriers to participation. Claire Miner took on a mandate to increase our outreach to the Para Nordic ski community. Stacey Payne and Kat Kitching's mandate included working with ISANS to connect with New Canadians. Michelle Richards worked with engaging members of Indigenous communities and under-resourced schools in rural Cape Breton.

As with any new program this was a year of establishing procedures and protocols. However, despite the time required to get things up and running, the outreach to the community far exceeded our initial expectations. A special mention of appreciation goes out to Cathy Caouette, our communications expert, who provided the timely and informative communications support to engage with the public. Member clubs reported high level of satisfaction from their engagement with the Ski Ambassador and the board supports continuing to deliver and grow this program next season.

Baddeck Nordic Report

Baddeck Nordic had a successful second season. Although the time snow was enable was only 5 weeks, considerable progress was made. I want to publicly thank my Board colleague, all club members and our sponsors and partners for their ideas, support and hard work this past season. We are making amazing progress

Some highlights:

- 1. Trail improvement and maintenance
- a. Some 5 km of trail excavated, widened and drainage improved; skiable trails now close to 10 KM

- b. Club purchase of ATV, utility snowmobile, sled and borrowed a groomer renovator and refurbished a roller
- c. An experienced snowmobile trail groomer volunteered to help us regularly, supported by two club members. Trails were groomed 15 times. Thank you Roger Wilcott.
- d. A new trail was cut across the top of a ridge to connect the north and south parts of the system. It is a trail that can be done by snowshoers and skiers of all abilities and it has the most amazing views in all directions
- e. Cutting trees, moving debris etc achieved through volunteers in several work parties; some 380 hours of volunteer time
- f. Grooming reports reported live and accessible through club website
- g. Baddeck Nordic is very grateful for the people who helped inform decisions about grooming equipment including Sheldon Garland, Wilf Kaiser, Ernie MacIntosh. all from Crowdis Mountain Snowmobile Club; Greg Stewart, The Keppoch; Lorenzo Caterini from Scotia XC and Daniel Murray and Tyler Germani from Baddeck Nordic
- 2. Trail head, signage and parking
- a. A club member built a trailhead kiosk that is used for an information board
- b. The parking area was excavated, levelled and surfaced with rock
- C..Durable signs were purchased for trailhead and trail system. These include directional, safety, levels of ability, trail descriptions, trail names, and trail system maps placed at intersections denoting "you are here". In addition, a large Baddeck Nordic Club with logo and graphics, and civic address was erected at the main entrance
- 3. Programs
- a. Club focus for the past year was on developing quality trail infrastructure and grooming. We were blessed to have Cross Country Ski Ambassador Michelle Richards in our area. She provided a number of clinics around the island, including several at schools in our County and 3 at Baddeck Nordic Trails. .this is a great program and one that our club strongly endorses. Michelle's expertise and commitment is a real asset
- b. The Baddeck Library Winter Equipment Loan program expanded the range and number of skis this year, thanks to Victoria County Recreation Dept. There is now a good range of sizes for kids, as well as adults and this addition will go a long way to promote skiing and snowshoeing for all ages. the Librbay staff do an amazing job of storing equipment and managing loan processes.
- 4. Membership increased from 35 in 2023 to 65 this year Day Pass users in 2023 numbered ten and increased to 85+ in 2024. We are getting great feedback from members and daily users
- 5. Fundraising and grants

The Club had two successful fundraisers through ticket sales. We were fortunate to be awarded a total of six different grants which made equipment purchases, trail improvements, signage and excavation possible. Several grants provided funds and allowed us to use those funds to "lever" other funding opportunities. Baddeck Nordic wants to thank CCNS for their contribution to our excavation project this past season. The impact is tremendous

- -Monthly newsletters were shared with embers and partners from November through April
- -Facebook proved to be a great way to market our trails.
- ; Baddeck Cross Country Skiers Followers increased from 35 to nearly 400 in a month
- -Cathy Caouette, CCNS worked with our Club secretary Nicoline Kerkhoven DeWitt to develop a website based on linktr-ee that is perfect for our needs. Hits during Feb and March were well over 1000. People can find trail information, buy a membership or day pass, see current grooming reports and pictures, etc
- Support from CCNS to market Baddeck Nordic was very helpful. Links on CCCNS website, Facebook etc were very useful to increase awareness of our club. CCNS support on a wide range of topics is very much appreciated

Cape Breton Nordic, 2024 AGM Report

Cape Breton Nordic had a year with another late start to the season. Despite that, there were a few very positive developments. This year have continued to improve our grooming capacity. We were able to remain financially stable due to memberships, generous donations and by a large group rental. This year our membership rebounded after a late season start with the final count of 33 members. The heavy February snow weekend was more of a challenge that expected. Thanks to club volunteers we were able to dig the trailer and equipment out and have many good days of skiing and snowshoeing through February prior to the heavy rains that ended the season. We continue to be thankful for our grooming team and some community volunteers that helped set up and take down the equipment for this season. As usual our community partner, Seaview Golf and Country club was a gracious host.

The Board of Directors remained positive following this season. We learned a great deal this season and have some very active and enthusiastic new members. Plans for next year include recruitment of new board members, community volunteers and members. We will be fine tuning our grooming equipment and expanding our grooming team so that we can groom quickly when conditions allow. We will work more diligently to provide opportunities for outdoor activities across the seasons. We look forward to providing try-it days and informal instruction in the 2024-25 season.



The three highlights of this season include:

- The hiring of a student club room supervisor in partnership with Cape Breton University's, Jennifer Keeping Centre for Accessible Learning.
- A partnership with Cadets Canada to provide a two-day camp opportunity getting close to 50 cadets on skis on the Cape Breton Nordic trails.
- Development of grooming expertise and capacity to make the best use of available snow.

Our goals remain to expand lessons and to develop several special events in conjunction with community partners locally,

Scotia XC Ski Club Report

SCOTIA XC SKI CLUB 2023-2024 REPORT



External Funding

With the completion of our capital expansion projects last year, SCOTIA XC did not pursue any external funding. The focus of the club shifted back towards grooming and program delivery. We are in an excellent position with brand new equipment at most locations and will start budgeting some of our annual revenue to be prepared for any inevitable maintenance and repairs that would be required as the equipment ages.

Membership

Our membership remains stable around ~400 member mark. This is a drop from the COVID years, presumably also reduced due to the shortened snow seasons we have been having.

Total Membership: 379 people (200 Female: 176 Male)

Family Memberships: 47

Adult Memberships: 168

Youth Memberships: 26

Brunello Pass: 70 Adults and 18 Families took advantage of having access to our human-made snow bowl area.

Day Pass use seems to be increasing annually. 59 passes were purchased to support the club's grooming efforts. Another 20 people chose to make a donation to our Fundraising campaign.

Member retention will be a goal for the 2024-2025 year.

Grooming Locations

<u>Brunello XC-</u> Our partnership with Brunello remains a key one. We are in year 2 of the move of the snowmaking area to the Driving Range (complete with the lights). We were once again impeded in our snow making efforts due to inspection related delays for the pump house which was moved closer to the range. Once up and running a 3-day snow making session was

completed and we were met with the unfortunate reality that the artificial snow does not seem to be surviving the exposed windy, sunny area of the range. Meetings with Brunello were held to talk about ways to improve the artificial snow making and increasing snow depth, expanding the wooded trail area and using the sheltered area more effectively are all options that are being considered. Fortunately, we were gifted a significant snowfall after the snowmaking attempt that kept the range open for skiers.

Conditions on the cart paths were the best they have been in years for the month of February making it a well skied destination for club members and members of the public alike.



Brunello also remains a key partner in offering on-site ski rentals which allows our membership to encourage others to try out our sport. Our grooming team of Curtis, Dave and Bill worked extremely hard taming the unusual snow depth to bring us a great skiable surface.

<u>Oakfield XC-</u> Oakfield XC had an extremely successful year. Excellent snow conditions and the combo of our groomers Roland and Ron meant Oakfield was also a well skied destination. The snow depth also allowed for classic track setting which is always a treat.



McDonald Sports Park—The decision was made to pause grooming at McDonald's Sports Park this year after a significant amount of trail damage due to the flooding this summer while continuing to observe the foot traffic. McDonalds Sport Park was a favorite ski destination for many within the club however, it has become clear that it is no longer feasible to continue to groom the location. Due to the nature of the trails, it requires significant snowfall for the coverage required to groom (rocky trail surface and significant canopy coverage) and unfortunately the grooming is walked on almost immediately afterwards as it is a very popular walking/dog walking destination. With limited volunteer groomers available, it is no longer an efficient use of resources to continue to groom going forward.

This is not a decision undertaken lightly as we recognize the historical importance of the Bryan Scallion Memorial Trail system.

<u>Graves Oakley-</u> Our small but mighty location in HRM has the ability to provide great skiing and acts as a back-up location for programming. Groomer Jim provides excellent skiing on very limited amounts of snow. We were also able to use the lights for night skiing early in the season.

<u>Dollar Lake-</u> We were caught off guard on this location this year. It had not been communicated to us that further construction projects would be happening in the park and this was not discovered until after we had completed our 1st groom. Unfortunately, when discovered, we learned that there would be ongoing projects and plowing of the main road into the park into the new year. We plan to be in communication with the Parks Department in the fall in order to communicate to the membership what the winter of the 2025 season will look like.

Our Valley locations did not receive the large snowfalls that we were blessed with in the HRM locations but were still able to have many skiable days as we were fortunate to not have too much rain or warm melt days.

<u>Haliburton House/Dill Farm-</u> We switched back to the Haliburton House location this year and Groomer Pam provided many great skiable days there.

<u>Kentville XC-</u> This location is made available through a generous private landowner partnership with Aberdeen Paving Ltd. This location remains a favorite with locals in the area. The terrain at this location is excellent for beginners. The skiing was reported to be excellent at this location when it was available. Lorenzo takes the lead with grooming at this location.

<u>Greenwood XC-</u> Groomers Jason and Damien were able to provide 4-8kms of skiable trails. When snow depth permits classic tracks are also set at this location.



Equipment

The only significant equipment required this year was a new storage can for the Greenwood XC grooming equipment. This was necessary as rodents were chewing into the electrical wires of the ATV.

Regular maintenance was performed as required.

Ski Season

We were fortunate to have an early season snowfall but then needed to wait impatiently until the end of January before we were able to begin our season in earnest. With little rain and minimal melt once the snow arrived it was consistent skiing for the month of February.


